#### **YWCA** Believes in Me

Fostering Dylan's confidence with reading

When you first meet Dylan, you are greeted with his warm energy. At just 6 years old, Dylan is already full of energy, curiosity and a love for learning. A first grader with a big personality, he's quick to share his favorite things — reading, playing outside and of course, popcorn. But beyond the fun snacks and playtime, YWCA Central Carolinas has become a place where Dylan is growing, learning and building confidence in himself.

"I like to read a lot," he says proudly. At YWCA, he practices his reading skills, sounding out words and working through early literacy activities with reading software like Amira Learning, an Al literacy tool that tailors plans and assessments based on the child's specific needs. Dylan's mom, Nicole, says her son is a quick learner and is already reading on a fourth-grade level.



Dylan's love for books doesn't stop at just one. When asked if he had a favorite, he quickly shook his head. "I don't have a favorite book... because I love a lot of books." That kind of curiosity and openness is exactly what YWCA aims to engage in every child who walks through the doors of its learning centers.

At YWCA's seven Youth Learning Centers (YLC) across Mecklenburg and Union counties, students like Dylan receive more than literacy-based programming and support — they discover their love for reading. YWCA's youth programs offer free, year-round programming for students from low-income communities. But for many children like Dylan, YWCA is more than just an after-school program, it's a place where they feel supported.

Billingsville YLC Coordinator Gwen Forney has made a big impact on Dylan's experience at YWCA. Her passion for literacy extends beyond the classroom and into the hearts of families. "She's a sweet lady. I love her," Nicole said of Gwen.

"She wanted her kids to read. That's her main goal — read. Because that's how you make it in the world," Nicole added. Reflecting on her son's experience at YWCA, the proud mom shared that Dylan has "opened up a lot at YWCA."

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### **Building Hope**

#### YWCA champions transformative community project

It's been quite busy on the front lawn of YWCA since the start of the year — and for good reason! **Grounds for Change, a transformative affordable housing project located on YWCA's 10-acre property, will become home to dozens of families and individuals in 2026.** 

The project, which is currently under construction, will provide 80 affordable housing units reserved for households earning 30%-60% of the area median income. It is a partnership between YWCA and DreamKey Partners, a nonprofit real estate development and finance corporation. YWCA is proud to contribute the land and significant philanthropic support for this project that advances our mission of eliminating racism, empowering women and promoting peace, justice, freedom and dignity for all.

The 80 units will contribute to alleviating Charlotte's lack of affordable housing, an urgent need that has grown to crisis proportions in recent years.

We know construction can be messy! While the campus of YWCA Central Carolinas undergoes significant construction in preparation for our new neighbors, we have been filled with gratitude and appreciation for the patience of our fitness members and participants in our Women in Transition and Families Together programs.

YWCA Central Carolinas remains committed to fostering equity and stability in our community, and this project represents a major step forward in providing desperately needed housing options for individuals and families. As a natural extension of our long-standing efforts through the Women in Transition and Families Together programs, which provide transitional housing and case management for women and families facing homelessness, Grounds for Change underscores YWCA Central Carolinas' dedication to addressing the homelessness and housing crisis in our city.

Originally announced in 2020 with plans to break ground in 2021, Grounds for Change faced delays due to the effects of the pandemic; however, YWCA's dedication to this project persevered.

"The visionary women of YWCA Central Carolinas have been dreaming big dreams for well over a century, but realizing THIS particular dream is especially inspiring, given all the delays we've faced. Our excitement and commitment to transforming these acres into affordable housing for 80 households has never wavered. That groundbreaking day finally arrived in January, bringing with it the opportunity to make a world of difference for generations to come," said Kirsten Sikkelee, former CEO and current Senior Project Liaison to Grounds for Change.

Looking ahead, YWCA is excited for the progress of Grounds for Change and is looking forward to welcoming 80 new households in 2026.

This is your opportunity to vote for local leaders, including mayors and city council members, who shape your community.




